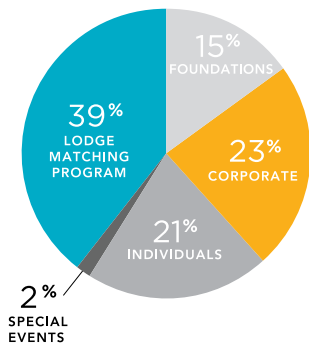

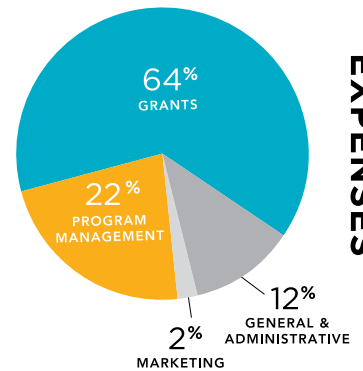


2018 SUMMARY OF REVENUE & EXPENSES

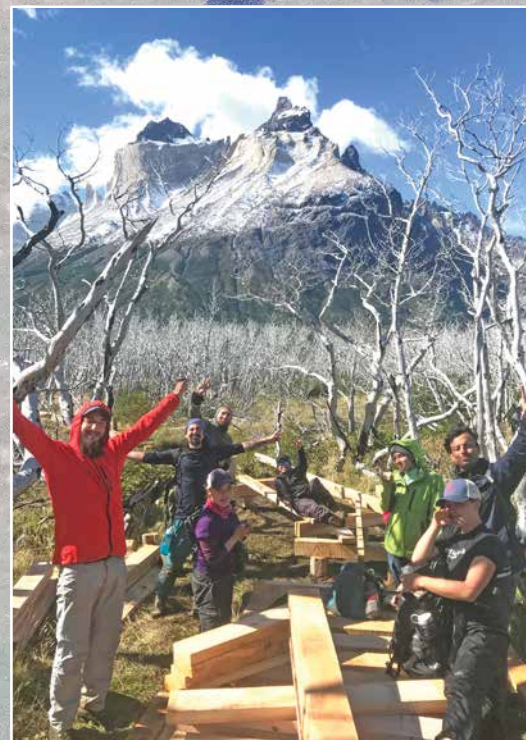

MADISON CONSERVATION DISTRICT

MONTANA

YDCCF awarded a grant to the Madison Conservation District to conduct Phase I of the Lower Jack Creek Restoration Project restoring and improving in-stream habitat in Jack Creek, an important tributary to the Madison River. Stream and riparian restoration and enhancement activities will support existing fisheries values and provide opportunities for the re-introduction of Arctic grayling.



TORRES DEL PAINE LEGACY FUND

CHILE

YDCCF awarded a grant to build new infrastructure and interpretive information to minimize visitor impacts and enhance appreciation of sensitive wetland ecosystems in Chile's Torres del Paine National Park. Funds supported the construction of a wooden boardwalk by 11 local volunteers and staff from the Torres del Paine Legacy Fund, who were assisted by 20 members from the Conservation Volunteers International Program. Two interpretive panels describing key components of the trail's ecosystems were also designed and installed to communicate the critical features of the ecosystem and wildlife to the estimated 80,000 annual visitors. In addition to trail improvements, the collaboration between the volunteers, park rangers and Conservation VIP volunteers cemented these young professionals' dedication to the park, and more broadly to public lands in Chile.

WAYNE'S WETLANDS

LOUISIANA

YDCCF provided a grant to Angler's Benefiting Louisiana's Estuaries (ABLE) to engage local students in environmental education programming that will encourage good environmental stewardship along the community's vulnerable coast. Wayne's Wetlands gives 4H high school students from St. Bernard and Plaquemines parishes an opportunity to engage in a 3-day learning experience that includes technical knowledges and hands-on experience regarding local fisheries and the coastal environment. Support from YDCCF allowed 12 students to spend 3 days in Wayne's Wetlands.

THE TAIMEN FUND

MONGOLIA

YDCCF provided a grant to assist The Taimen Fund (TTF) for their Riverkeeper program in the Eg Watershed, Hovsgol Province, Mongolia. The River Keeper Program is an ambitious anti-poaching project spanning a total of seven different villages throughout the Eg Watershed, along approximately 120 miles of river. Funding from YDCCF supported an extensive network of anti-poaching efforts through the Eg-Uur watershed of Mongolia and an increase of awareness of the country's fishing regulations both on the water and within the communities of the watershed. The Riverkeepers logged more than 1900km of patrols by horseback, boat and jeep and found 122 individuals fishing unlicensed. The Riverkeepers collected fines and confiscated illegal gear, and issued warnings. The community of the Eg-Uur watershed now has a wider understanding of the value of legally fishing for both taimen and lenok.

AMBERGRIS CAYE CITIZENS FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

BELIZE

YDCCF provided a grant to Ambergris Caye Citizens for Sustainable Development (ACCSD) to oppose the Cayo Rosario Development- specifically the over water structures in a marine reserve. Funds provided by YDCCF provided the ability for ACCSD to retain a lawyer and engage in research to support the litigation. Simultaneously, ACCSD is spearheading an initiative to reform environmental impact assessment laws in Belize that align with best practices adopted by neighboring countries to reduce the incidence of projects like Cayo Rosario from moving forward. This is an important project addressing potential development threats to the Hol Chan Marine Reserve.





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
